Clifford Gerald Augerman was born 9 November 1923 at Merritton, now part of St.

AUGERMAN-CADE -Parsonage, Napanee, by Rev. Dr. Shorey, on Tuesday, Oct, 12th, 1920, Mr. William G. Augerman, of Merriton, Ont., and Miss Laura V. Cade of Bath.

At Trinity Catharines, Ontario (ON). His parents William Gordon Augerman and Laura Violet Cade, both of English descent, were married at Nappanee, ON in 1920.

William and Laura had two sons: Clifford and later Allen. William was a long term employee with Alliance Paper in Merritton, working as a bag maker among other tasks. The Augermans were members of the St. James Anglican Church in Merritton.

Clifford completed two of years of High School in Merritton before guitting to work full time age sixteen. He gained some



experience as a truck driver and became a machine operator for Hayes Steel in Merritton.

Clifford attested 29 September 1943 at Toronto, ON age 19. He was then 5'11" tall, 149 lbs with blue eyes. His medical examination noted a burn scar on his left forearm. Clifford was allocated to the Royal Canadian Army Service Corps (RCASC) and spent the next few months as a Driver at their Toronto Depot. He was posted to the Canadian Infantry Basic Training Centre at Brantford, ON 23 December 1943 and reported there following his Christmas leave time. Clifford was then assigned to Camp Borden, ON for advanced infantry training 25 January 1944.

Clifford was sent to the Canadian Driving and Maintenance School at Woodstock, ON 19 March 1944. He qualified as Driver Class III for both Wheeled and Universal Carriers 22 June 1944.

Group "C" (Carrier) 3 July 1944. His army training record remarks dated 7 September 1944 indicated that Clifford was well adjusted and had made good progress in training. Clifford was cleared for overseas service and following embarkation leave passed through Camp Debert, Nova Scotia before disembarking in the UK 28 November 1944 where he reported to the Canadian Infantry Training Regiment. He was selected for duty as a replacement soldier with 1st Canadian Infantry Division which was engaged in the Italian campaign. Clifford disembarked in Italy 24 January 1945 and was taken on strength by the Loyal Edmonton Regiment (LER) 14 February

1945.

The LER, also known as the 'Loyal Eddies' formed part of 2nd Brigade with the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI) and the Seaforth Highlanders of Canada. 2nd Brigade and 1st Canadian Infantry Division (1CID) had served in the Italian campaign since summer 1943. When Clifford joined them they were in the process of being redeployed to

Northwest Europe under Operation GOLDFLAKE.


Allied ship loaded with vehicles and supplies entering Marseilles, France Harbour 1945 during Operation GOLDFLAKE

Clifford disembarked with his regiment at Marseilles, France 15 March 1945 and travelled in convoy with 1CID to Belgium.



The

Loyal Eddies and 2nd Brigade crossed the Ijssel River between Zutphen and Deventer in the Netherlands 11 April 1945 to support 3rd Canadian Infantry Division. They deployed into position as a bridgehead on the left flank of the Seaforths on the west side of the Ijssel by 0145 hours 12 April. "C" Company then relieved a company of Seaforths. A pontoon bridge was rapidly constructed and all necessary battalion vehicles were able to cross by 0315 hours. The LER "A" Company advanced south at 1430 hours 12 April 1945, supported by artillery fire and a troop of tanks to attack the enemy positioned at a dyke wall west of the river. They captured 13 prisoners. "D" Company made a similar advance, using mortars and flame throwers. "B"



Company then made their advance and by 1715 hours were firm on their objectives. Clifford Augerman was one of several LER casualties that day, dying of his wounds at 3 Canadian Casualty Clearing Station, age 21.

MERRITTON, April 18.—Mr. and Mrs. William Augerman, 34 Merritt street, Merritton, received word yesterday that their son, 21-year-old Pte. Clifford Augerman of the Canadian Infantry Corps. has been killed in action in Belgium while serving with his unit.

Pte. Augerman was born and raised in Merritton, and attended Merritton public and high schools. He was an eager worker at the Hayes Steel Co. before his enlistment in the Canadian Army two years ago: After intensive training in Canada, he went overseas in December, 1944, where he served a short time in Italy. WILLIAM G. AUGERMAN William Gordon Augerman 73, of 14 Hastings St., died today in St. Catharines General Hospital after a long illness.

Born in London, Ont., he had lived in this city for 65 years and had been an employee of the Alliance Paper Co. for 41 years, retiring in 1962.

He was a member of St. James Anglican Church, was interested in all branches of sport and was at one time a well-known baseball player in Merritton.

He is survived by his wife, Laura; a son, W. Allen, city; two brothers, John and Fred, Catharines Standard 1988 city; two sisters, Mrs. William Hope and Mrs. Francis Hearn. city; and two granddaughters. A son, Clifford, was killed overseas in the Second World War.
