Private James Edward LINWOOD 08-A-12

James Edward Linwood was born on May 2, 1911 in Niagra Falls, Ontario, as son of Alexander and Eva May Linwood. Originally Finley was religious, he belonged to the United Church, James was a professional salesman and bartender. James has been up to his 14th year to school to Seniors 43 public school. In addition, he followed a cooking course in June and July 1942. Besides was James Linwood keen at any sport. He loved football. On August 11, 1943 Linwood has enlisted in the Canadian army. During his military service, James Edward Linwood assigned to the North Shore Regiment and left for Europe. During his stay in Europe, he was told that his mother was seriously ill. He asked to be allowed to return to Canada to be with his mother. It was not to be allowed to visit his dying mother, because the estimate was that her health was not life threatening. In response to this rejection James Linwood was looking for a way to deal with his grief. The solution to his grief Linwood found in the drink. After a few weeks of having resorted to drink his irritating behavior was no longer tolerated and he was being put. When he showed improvement after a few days, because he was sober, he was transported to be observed in hospital. On October 23, 1945, he was taken out of the cell to be transferred, but at that time he was found dead on the floor. The study did not show a direct cause of death. There were no visible injuries, no heart abnormalities or infections. The only clue was to be found there before his death,

were clogged blood veins in the lungs, which could be caused by heart failure.

James Edward Linwood was 34 years and had the rank of soldier. He had blue eyes and brown hair. He was first buried in a temporary cemetery in Germany, and in 1946 his remains were transferred to the final resting place at the Canadian War Cemetery in Holten
