

Pte. George Sydeny Wakely was the son of Sidney and Mabel Wakely and husband of Ida Wakely of Port Hope, Ontario.

He went overseas with the Stormont, Dundas and Glengarry Highlanders and fought his way through Western Europe. On April 27th, 1945, the Glens moved into Northern Germany for the last big operation of the war.

Tactical units were set up at Bingum, just across the River Ems from the city of Leer, which was strongly in German hands. Machine gun nests lined the river banks. Two companies were to assult across the river from west to east and establish themselves on the dyke. Artillery was to pound the dyke and town and lay down smoke along the dyke. Two other companies of the Glens were to follow the attacking two companies and move on to Leer. Engineers were to take the troops across in assault boats.

In this battle that was going on April 28th 1945, George Sydney Wakely was wounded and died due to loss of blood.
